HYWEL ROBERTS

Originally a drama teacher cutting his teeth in some of the North of England's most demanding school environments – including special schools and PRUs - Hywel shows how to bring the learning to life for even the most disaffected children and young people. In particular, he has drawn on and adapted the work of Dorothy Heathcote, with whom he studied, and her powerful Mantle of the Expert approach to learner engagement.

Tapping into children's innate curiosity and willingness to suspend disbelief in the company of an engaging adult, Hywel shows teachers how to breathe life into the curriculum in a way that has children learning and eager for more, despite their best intentions. It is this ability to 'trick' children and young people into learning that led to the naming of his hugely popular first book *Oops! Helping children learn accidentally.*
